The typeface Helvetica was designed by Max Miedinger (<a href="http://www.linotype.com/522/maxmiedinger.html">http://www.linotype.com/522/maxmiedinger.html</a>) in 1957. (<a href="http://www.youtube.com/watch?v=8-TpEsSihgA">http://www.youtube.com/watch?v=8-TpEsSihgA</a>).

It originally was called Neue Haas Grotesk, but to make sure that this typeface could attrackt more international interest, it was eventually called after the latin word for Switserland, Helvetica.

This typeface was inspired on the typeface 'Akzidenz Grotesk'.

It was a sansserif typeface that was initially, and through some still, seen as anonymous, neutral and without Character. On the other hand, the characterless aspect about Helvetica was appreciated by many because the Form of the typeface was modest and submissive so that all the attention was attracted to the meaning of the word.

Helvetica was universally embraced for a time by both the corporate and design worlds as a nearly perfect typeface to be used for anything and everything. "When in doubt, use Helvetica" was a common rule.

Because Helvetica was considered too expensive by Microsoft, the company created their own typeface, Arial. (<a href="http://www.ms-studio.com/articles.html">http://www.ms-studio.com/articles.html</a>)
Arial appears to be a loose adaptation of Monotype's venerable Grotesque series, redrawn to match the proportions and weight of Helvetica.
